We wish you the very best, Johnnie! We are so grateful for the dedication and incredible value you've brought to GCE and the entire LifeView Group organization. You will be missed!


KennyWare joins the GCE family!



Eye protection

Eye protection has many forms. There are hundreds of types of safety glasses and goggles. All are designed to do one thing – protect your eyes (although some types are better at performing certain functions and more fully protecting your eyes).

Some safety glasses are really good at stopping flying debris from entering your eye. However,

because they do not fit tightly to your forehead or cheek, gaps exist and could potentially allow things like liquids to pass around the protection and enter the eye. When using concentrated corrosive chemicals, chemical-resistant goggles are needed to ensure these potentially damaging chemicals do not enter your eye. Employees with prescription glasses should have some type of side shield protection or wear the over-the-glasses style eye protection. This keeps fluids and debris from going around eyeglasses and entering the eye.

Eye injury often occurs when individuals are not wearing eye protection when needed. For those in custodial work, team members must be wearing eye protection any time they are performing cleaning tasks. Those in food service need to wear eye protection any time they are working in an environment with potential for splashing liquid, flying debris or particles in the air that can enter the eye. This includes team members in pots/pans, dishwashing areas, serving food and performing cleaning duties.

GCE provides eye protection at no cost for team members. It is the team member's responsibility to ensure proper care of the equipment. Please report damaged or broken equipment, and it will be replaced by your supervisor. If the protection you are provided does not fit properly, please report the situation to your supervisor so that we can take the best care of you and your eyes.

Eye protection only works if it's unbroken, fits and worn when required!
