GCE Team Member of the Year 2023 - Hayli Gourley

Hayli works on the food services team at Global Connections to Employment (GCE) in Tacoma, Washington at Joint Base Lewis-McChord.

Hayli started working at GCE 13 years ago as a dining facility attendant. She immediately wanted to advance and set out to learn just about every food services job there is. About two years ago, she signed up for the GCE Lead Program to learn how to support a team. Hayli also took the SERV Safe test multiple times, each time scoring higher. She persevered and dedicated herself away from work and in study sessions with the management team until she passed. Then she got her big promotion to shift supervisor.

Hayli leads two teams: 1) pots and pans, a 5-person team and 2) the clipper room (dish room), a 4-person team. She has a hectic schedule, but she coaches and mentors team members in a collaborative and productive way. "Depending on the work area, I show team members how to do the job. I got help (once) too, so I know how to help others the same way I learned," Hayli said. "I show them step-by-step how to do the best they can." For example, one of the most important tasks in the dish room is to make sure they monitor the water temperature for sterilization purposes. Someone must check it every 30 minutes. She also keeps an eye out for customers who need assistance. If she can't help them, she personally escorts them to someone who can.

Hayli's supervisor, assistant project manager Doreen Weed, said, "Hayli is a selfless person. She always puts others ahead of herself and always strives to do bigger and better."

Typically, I use this space to discuss safety concerns important to GCE team members. This month, I would like to use this opportunity to give positive feedback and thank some folks who have been instrumental in reducing injuries at GCE.

First, thanks to everyone for their efforts to reduce injuries and promote safety at GCE. In the past five years, we've decreased our number of

injuries per year by half. We still have some work to do because even one injury is still too many. However, we are certainly making great strides.

Second, everyone has contributed toward making GCE a safer place to work. I don't have enough space to thank each person, but I plan to recognize specific team members more often going forward.

Thanks to Betty Geren. She always partners with me on safety issues at her sites and is willing to listen to me talk about safety for hours, if necessary. Two of Betty's sites made dramatic changes and have greatly improved safety. I also give a big thanks to Natasha Hall, Doreen Weed and their team at JBLM, as well as Mikala January, Heatherlee Martin and their team at Fort Johnson. They all worked very hard to make their sites safer and have significantly reduced injuries. They routinely assist me in developing safety strategies. Although Don Stewart has only recently started as a project manager at JBLM, I am confident he is going to continue what Natasha started.

Pam Cox and her team at the Armed Forces Retirement Home in D.C. custodial services have not had an OSHA recordable injury in more than eight years. That goes back to before I came to work at GCE! Pam of course would say she doesn't do anything special. However, she works very hard to ensure every team member at her site is fully trained in every task they perform. She ensures each team member knows the process for cleaning, and then she holds them to a very high standard. Unsafe work is not permitted – ever. That's a pretty good recipe for preventing injuries!

Storage space is always at a premium on all of our contracts. Benefits planning and Social Security

Work Incentives Planning & Assistance (WIPA)

GCE offers benefits planning and counseling services to team members receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI). Work Incentives Planning & Assistance (WIPA) promotes employment through informed choice and the effect of work on individual benefits. WIPA services increase financial freedom and

enhance self-sufficiency by assisting team members with managing their benefits in a responsible way.

Services include:

- Informing and educating beneficiaries and their stakeholders about SSI/SSDI benefits and work incentives
- Conducting a comprehensive analysis presenting options for consideration
- Providing benefits counseling, advocacy and support planning

Services do not include:

- Assistance with the SSI/SSDI application process
- Legal representation or assistance with the SSA appeals process
- Tax or investment advisement

Quality inspection changes for CompuClean

As many of you know, we are transitioning sites that currently use TAMS for Quality Inspections to a new system called CompuClean. So far, the feedback has been fantastic. One of the great aspects of this system is the Corrective Action (CA) process that is built in.

It is more robust than TAMS and is much easier to navigate and address issues to tailor performance at every site.

Why do we need a more robust CA procedure at GCE?

- Performing CA's will prove to our customers that we take quality seriously.
- Our customers can see the actions we're taking every day to provide the services they require.
- CA's can show where you and your site may need training to improve.
- It will assist project managers in holding team members accountable.

On a final note, GCE's quality data is not only used for purposes of Internal Quality Scores, but also for our future and the Business Development process. Many times, when we are responding to an opportunity to provide services (a new contract), we must prove our past performance. One of the ways we do this is with our quality data. We need to show that we perform the quality processes that we say we do. I believe we all want a bright future for GCE and that we will "never settle" for status quo. You all strive for that.
